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OUTCOMES FOR PUPILS	2
<p>St. Saviour's Catholic Primary School, through the dedication of the Headteacher, Deputy Headteacher, staff, Parish Priest and governors, provides a good Catholic education with some outstanding features. The children are proud of their school community. They feel safe, happy and are respectful to each other, to adults and to visitors. Children are happy to express their own views and beliefs and to share the pride they have for their school. They are aware that there are people in the local and international community who need help and are eager to support these groups through prayer and fund raising. There are a high percentage of non-Catholic children within the school. As a result a significant number of pupils commence school life with little knowledge of the Catholic faith. However, it is a credit to the school that standards achieved in Religious Education are comparable to standards achieved in other subjects and are in line with national expectations. The standards of work in children's books, assessment outcomes and discussions with pupils, show that they are making good progress.</p> <p>All lessons observed by inspectors were judged to be good. The quality of resources used is of a high standard. Teachers made good use of technology and of religious artefacts. The children were eager to be involved in, and able to bring previous learning and knowledge of Bible stories to the discussions. Children, in lessons observed in Key Stage 2, were able to use Bibles to find scripture passages and relate them to the activity they were completing. They settled quickly to their work and listened to and valued each other's views. The behaviour of children in all classes was excellent.</p> <p>In the Collective Worship observed the children were reverent, thoughtful, and obviously used to coming together as a whole school or class to pray together and reflect on God's message. The scripture readings, songs and music contributed to meaningful Acts of Worship. The liturgies were well planned, engaged all children and allowed time for quiet reflection. Pupils are aware of and understand the importance of key celebrations throughout the Liturgical Year. They are aware of the importance of prayer and that there are different ways to pray, such as singing, quiet prayer, meditation, praying together in class, as well as their own private prayers. They understand that prayer is important in our relationship with God and know how Jesus taught us to pray. The Prayer Garden is a source of pride for the whole school community. The children know it is a place where they can go with their class, friends or individually, to celebrate God's Message through drama, music, silent reflection or quiet prayer. The school has successfully introduced The Angelus as a daily Act of Worship across the whole school.</p>	

LEADERS AND MANAGERS	2
<p>The Headteacher clearly leads this faith community. The school leaders, staff, governors and Parish Priest are deeply committed to the school and the Church's mission in education. Members of the Governing Body, whilst allowing the senior management team to drive the school forward, are rigorous in their questioning and are aware of their responsibilities. They are justly proud of the progress the school has made in a relatively short period of time. There is a nominated governor for Religious Education who speaks with the Headteacher and staff regularly. Governors are also kept informed by committee meetings and weekly newsletters. The leadership team and governors carefully monitor all areas of the Religious Education curriculum. Outcomes from the scrutiny of planning, teaching, learning, pupils' workbooks, assessment and tracking of pupils' progress are used to identify areas for improvement and professional development training is provided for staff and governors. However, the leadership team is aware that this is an area for further development.</p> <p>The questionnaires, returned by parents, indicate overwhelming support for the school. Parents are happy with the values and attitudes that the school promotes. They are kept informed of all aspects of school life through regular newsletters and are invited to attend school Masses and class celebrations.</p>	

PROVISION	2
<p>All teaching observed by the inspectors was good. Lessons are well planned, differentiated and engage the children's interest. The children's questionnaires indicate that they enjoy their Religious Education lessons and enjoy the opportunity for role play, art, singing, discussion, reflection and quiet prayer. Staff training is being used to develop teachers' own knowledge and spirituality, which is assisting them to inform and guide the children's development of their own prayer life and spirituality.</p> <p>The religious focal points and outstanding religious displays strongly add to the ethos of the school. The school can be truly proud of the Prayer Garden and its role in the life of the whole school community.</p> <p>The Parish Priest has a particular responsibility for Religious Education and is very involved in the life of the school, visiting on a regular basis to talk to children and staff. Class Mass is celebrated in the school each week and this is the Parish Mass for the day. Key celebrations throughout the Liturgical Year are also led by the Parish Priest within the school. The joint Home/School/Parish Sacramental Preparation Programme, which all children participate in, continues to strengthen the links between these groups within the school community. The provision of Religious Education meets the requirements of the Bishop's Conference.</p>	

OVERALL EFFECTIVENESS	2
<p>St Saviour's Catholic Primary School provides a good Catholic education with some outstanding features. The children, staff and governors, in their relationships and daily celebrations, reflect the school's Mission Statement: "St. Saviour's is a caring school family of God's children committed to lifelong learning rooted in the Catholic Faith."</p> <p>Everyone involved in the school community is valued and this is reflected in the Religious Education provided and informs the improvements that are being made.
